When I began pastoring my first church in Indiana, I found out that the previous interim pastor had lived in Indianapolis about 60 minutes away from the town where the church was located. In the winter, when weather presented hazardous driving conditions, the pastor always checked in with the congregation (via email) early on Sunday morning to be sure that streets were cleared of snow and passable for him to get there for worship. One of my habits after I began pastoring there was to continue these early morning emails so the congregation and I could get to know one another a little better. This is one of those emails that I sent to that congregation one Sunday in September in 2018. Enjoy!:

I've been ruminating over a couple of ideas for the last few weeks; it involves how God teaches us, in the here and now, about God's grace and love towards us.

I have been blessed to learn a little about God's love and grace in my life because of the ways that others have loved me. There have been occasions in my life when others have loved me with a sacrificial love that revealed to me a bit more about how God loves me. There have been people who have extended grace in times that I did not earn or deserve that favor.

Recently, I am experiencing God teaching me a bit more about God's grace and love in another way. God is calling and allowing me to show God's love and grace to others. Sometimes God teaches us by gifting us and sometimes God teaches us by allowing us to be the bearers of those gifts. Learning by giving is a different way of learning. Maybe that is what it means to be a disciple and why discipleship is so hard. It is life giving to receive God's gifts; it is humbling to be the bearers of those gifts to others.

Preparing Vegs grown in JPC Community Garden

INGREDIENTS

Preheated oven 400 I butternut squash - peeled, seeded, cut into I inch cubes 2 tablespoons olive oil 2 cloves garlic Salt and pepper to taste



Toss butternut squash with olive oil and garlic in a large bowl. Season with salt and black pepper. Arrange coated squash on a baking sheet. Roast in the preheated oven until squash is tender and lightly browned, 25 to 30 minutes.

Alternative: Squash can be boiled and mashed like a potato.

<u>Alphabet Soup – QCDs, IRAs & RMDs</u> <u>What You Should Know</u>

Tax time is approaching – it's a great time to think about using QCDs from your IRAs to meet your RMDs. Confused? Read on!

The Tax Cuts and Jobs Act law passed in 2018 nearly doubled the standard deduction and eliminated or restricted many itemized deductions in 2018 through 2025. As a result fewer taxpayers are itemizing on their returns. That might make doing taxes easier, but those who use the standard deduction may miss out on several popular tax breaks, including claiming a deduction for donations they make to a qualified charity. It also hurts those charities' bank accounts, if donors who were partially motivated by the tax break decide to no longer give. Fortunately, there is a strategy that can keep both givers (at least those who are retirement age) and getters on course with charitable donations.

Taxpayers age 70½ and older can use a qualified charitable distribution to donate up to \$100,000 annually directly from a traditional IRA to an eligible public charity without counting that amount as taxable income. Instead, it would count toward their required minimum distribution and reduce the taxable amount of their mandatory withdrawal.

Some definitions:

QCD stands for **Qualified Charitable Distribution**, sometimes referred to as a charitable IRA rollover.

A Required Minimum Distribution (RMD) is the amount of money the owner of an individual retirement account (IRA) must withdraw from their plan during the year. RMDs now start in the year the owner turns 72 (previously it was $70\frac{1}{2}$) and equal a prescribed fraction of the plan balance at the end of the previous year. The older the owner, the larger the fraction of the plan balance the owner must withdraw whether they need that money or not in that year.

So what do I need to know?

1. Each person can donate the full amount of his or her RMD, up to a maximum of \$100,000 annually.

2. You should work with your IRA custodian to correctly accomplish a QCD. The distribution must go straight from the IRA account to the charity, not through your bank account.

3. Be sure to inform your tax preparer that you did a QCD. It must be noted in your tax return to obtain the benefit.

4. It's permissible to use less than the full RMD for the charitable distribution. Generally there are not low limits on how much you can donate.

5. For a QCD to count toward your minimum annual IRA distribution, it must meet the same deadline as a normal distribution (usually Dec. 31.)

6. Timing matters. The first dollar out of an IRA is considered to be the RMD. So, if you take money out early in the year, that distribution would count toward your RMD and you could potentially lose the tax benefit of the QCD. Work with your financial planner or tax accountant.

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Other benefits:

Since the tax reform arrived in 2018, QCDs have become more valuable than ever. Many taxpayers now take the standard deduction, eliminating the tax deduction for charitable gifts. QCDs add to the standard deduction by allowing the donations made from the IRA to be excluded from income. With a QCD, you get a tax break for your charitable contribution even if you are using the standard deduction.

Another benefit of a QCD is that the amount transferred from the IRA to the charity is not included in your adjusted gross income (AGI) for the year. By not including the distribution in AGI you can potentially avoid the loss of exemptions, deductions, credits and phase outs, AMT (alternative minimum tax), the 3.8% surtax on net investment income, and the increase in Social Security premiums for Medicare Part B and Part D.

In Closing:

If you're already 70½ but the QCD strategy is new to you, be sure to discuss your specific situation and any questions with a qualified tax professional. If you haven't turned 70½ yet, it's still worth having a conversation about how to prepare to take advantage of this strategy in the future.

For those who are charitably inclined and won't be able to itemize their deductions, a QCD can be a win-win: You get to satisfy your RMD and exclude income from your AGI, and the charities that are important to you (like JPC!!) will continue to benefit from your generosity.
