

Art told me that his earliest memories of Christmas were at this Grandmother Buck's home where Christmas morning was always magical. He would go to bed on Christmas Eve and when he woke up on Christmas morning the bare tree had been fully decorated, Santa had come and there were beautifully wrapped packages under the tree! Overnight the whole room had been transformed from **almost** Christmas to the wonder of Christmas morning! It was an overwhelming delight!

As we head towards Christmas, our Christian heritage takes us through Advent. Advent is a time of preparation to ready us for the transforming delight when we celebrate the birth of Jesus. A birth that changes everything! We go from an empty Holy of Holy's in the temple that is filled only with an empty throne of judgement to a new revelation. God is with us! God has built his temple among us and has chosen to dwell in our neighborhood. That can be the wonder we find this Christmas if we prepare ourselves for the coming moment. But in order to prepare ourselves we have to put off Christmas until after Advent. And that is a problem for us in this modern age. We are bombarded with Christmas months before December even gets near.

How can we change our hearts, our focus, our longings so that Christmas morning is our day of wonder no matter how many gifts lie beneath the tree?

We have a stenciled message we post beneath our tree each year. It is an old puritan saying that says, "Christmas lies not beneath the tree but in the hearts of thee and me." How do we get Christmas into our hearts? Through Advent.

So, this is where I'd like us to go this year. Through Advent.

What really got me thinking about all of this was an advertisement for an Advent Book that read:

"Advent is not an appetizer. Advent is the meal."
And my next thought was, "and Christmas is dessert!"

How would Advent be different for us if we considered Advent our main meal? A meal to linger over during the upcoming 4 weeks. A meal to share with friends. A meal where we share our lives and those hard questions of life. A time where we long for a solution to all the sordid problems of our world. How would Advent be different if we pondered what we could do to solve those problems and then were surprised by God's solution on Christmas morning.

Advent serves as the beginning of our Christian year. A time for renewing our commitments to God. A time of recounting God's goodness to us. A time of looking back and a time of looking ahead within the presence of those we love and cherish and within the presence of God.

As we approach Advent we gather round the Advent Wreath, an unbroken circle decorated with evergreens, pinecones, and holly. The circle reminds us that we live and die with God, eternal. We are reminded in our Presbyterian Brief Statement of Faith, "in life and in death we belong to God." Evergreens remind us of God's faithfulness to us; holly and its berries

symbolize the crown of thorns and the drops of blood that Christ shed for us; the pinecone is a symbol of resurrection as it holds the tiny seeds that grow the giant evergreens. Each time we see the Advent wreath, these symbolisms give us cause to meditate on the wonders of our faith and the everyday presence of that faith around us.

With each week that draws us closer to Christmas Day, we experience a different bite, a different flavor of what is before us. With our Advent wreath in the center, we gather with friends and family around the table and open the mouths of our heart to feed on the wonder of the first candle. The first candle, initiating our first thoughts of the coming year is often referred to as the prophet's candle or a candle of hope. What might hope smell like, taste like? Let your senses soar as you take that first bite of hope. Where have we seen and heard the good news of a coming hope? Who have been the prophets in our lives that served to remind us of God's presence among us? How might we offer that hope and promise to others around us in the coming year? Why is hope so important? Nelson Mandela said, "May your choices reflect your hope, not your fear." It is important to keep our hopes ever before us. Psalm 39:7, "And now, O Lord, what do I wait for? My hope is in you.

The second week of Advent moves us on a journey. The second candle symbolizes faith or is sometimes referred to as the Bethlehem candle. Journeys often take time so let's take some time as we savor this journey of faith. We may need to consider its flavor in several different bites. Each bite may be little different, and it will take time to get through this portion of our meal. We contemplate the journeys in our lives much like we contemplate the journey of Mary and Joseph to Bethlehem. Not all our journeys are easy. Many of our journeys seem to come at inopportune times. Oftentimes we step out on a journey not knowing what the end of that journey will be or look like. What keeps us moving forward? What tempts us to abandon and/or call off our journey? If we knew the end, would we keep going; or would we change paths; or would we stop and turn back? What might we learn about the journey or ourselves in these differing scenarios of journey? How does faith influence our journey and how does our journey influence our faith? "In faith there is enough light for those who want to believe and enough shadows to blind those who don't." Blaise Pascal (https://www.brainyquote.com/topics/faith-quotes) Hebrews 11:10, "Now faith is the assurance of things hoped for, the conviction of things not seen."

Our third morsel to enjoy during this Advent meal is pure Joy. Maybe it is your favorite hamburger, or a steak, or a slice of vegetarian lasagna. Whatever your pleasure, this week we think about joy. I am struck by the fact that in lighting the Shepherds' candle, we find them at their work. They are in the midst of tending their sheep in the middle of night when they receive this message of joy. I think this says something about the work we are called to do. Frederick Buechner says, "The place God calls you to is the place where your deep gladness and the world's deep hunger meet." God cares about our work. Work is not just a job or tasks we perform to pay our bills; our work is a calling based on our God-given talents and gifts. God wants us to find joy in what we do and to think of our work as a calling. How does your work fulfill that calling in your life? If you are not working or retired, how did you see God's calling in the work you did and how do you sense God calling you to spend your "Unworking time" in the here and now? We are not always able to find that perfect work that gives us joy right away, but there can be satisfaction in doing our work in good faith and in hope as the author of Colossians 3:23 reminds us, "Whatever your task, put yourselves into it, as done for the Lord and not for your masters." How has your work brought you joy? Why is it important that God deems to bring us joy even in the midst of our work? Psalm 16:11, You show me the path of life. In your presence there is fullness of joy; in your right hand are pleasures forevermore.

As we near the end of our meal, we find peace. We are feeling satisfied and grateful for the tasty morsels that have made up this meal. As we sample the last bites we remember the Angels, we remember the message, "Peace on earth, Goodwill to all humankind." The angels proclaim not only the glory of an amazing birth but also the announcement of a coming KING! The candle on the wreath before us is the last one to be lit. Lighting this candle means we are ready to start a new year based on peace, faith, joy and a now a new promise brought to us by angels – not a promise of fear but a promise of peace and a promise of new birth and a promised king. Perhaps we should ponder, before we leave this table what it means to have God's promises being fulfilled in our lifetime. Perhaps even more accurately and acutely for us living in the 21st century, what does it mean to have God's promises being fulfilled in our lives? Where are we seeing God's peace take shape in our lives, in our families, in our world? How can we be harbingers of this peace? What words and/or actions would you use to proclaim, "God's Peace on earth, God's will to all humankind?" "Great **peace** have those who love your law; nothing can make them stumble." Psalm 119:165

Our Advent meal is done. The next time we gather we will light our way into the next year with a lovefest. God's lovefest for us, shown in the birth of the Christ-child. The essence of our eternity living with us on this earth; busying himself with the messiness of our lives, our relationships, our dirty world. Yet even in that messiness the light of love shines in the darkness and allows us to see, with God's eyes, the beauty of our hope that lives within us, the strength of our faith that came before us and leads us forward, the joy that comes from living within the calling and work of our creator and the peace that reigns upon us from on high as we make room for that peace on earth.

Christmas brings us renewed hope, faith, joy and peace. May you enjoy a slow-paced meal through the season of Advent. May you close your eyes to rest on Christmas eve and celebrate the wonder of how everything changes on Christmas morning. For on Christmas Day, we celebrate the birth, but we see and experience anew, the risen LORD! May you be transformed by the wonder and mystery!
