Footprints in the Snow

It is hard to fathom that as you read this we will be somewhere in the middle (potentially) of our third snow event in a three-week period. While none of these have been the Snowmageddon that the news media told us they might be and I have enough bread to last me through three winters, they have still resulted in school closings, church closings, and shoveling! Shoveling is a mixed bag for me. I love the silence during a snowfall. I also love the cleanliness of the air when you breathe and the smell of the snow. If you have never noticed these, I would encourage you to pay attention next time. Listen, breathe, and smell the storm, if only for a moment, and you will see what I mean. I even love the physical exertion of moving snow. I hate to be cold and I hate having wet feet, so sometimes snow causes me problems.

During the second snowfall I worked with several men of the church on snow removal. While we removed ice, I learned a trick. Gary Fulp was using his leaf blower to move the snow and to lift the ice. The blower forced air under the ice which would lift it and cause it to crack. The force of the air would either blow the cracked ice into a pile or would hold it up high enough to get a shovel or something under it. This worked much better than the traditional "chip away at it" method. I took this trick home with me and found that my family was much more interested in shoveling with power tools. Julia really took a liking to it and is now our designated backpack blower Shovel Queen. She would basically knock it loose and we would move it to the side. She even came to the church with me to clear the CLC entrance.

One of the mornings, I was out to clear the snow on the driveway earlier than my family was awake. I waited for a reasonable time, as not to disturb the neighbors, and fired up my leaf blower. The snow was a fine powder and blew up all over the place. It looked like I was standing directly under the snow machines at a ski resort. It was fun and it was cold enough that it wasn't melting on me, so I kept at it. As I moved up the driveway, the tire tracks from where we had driven over the snow were more resistant to the wind. Some of them lifted up, while others would take days to leave our very shady driveway. As I made my way up the driveway, I noticed some tracks in the snow. They appeared to be either squirrel or rabbit, but my Boy Scout days are long behind me. Thinking nothing of it I kept on blowing the driveway. I finished in about fifteen minutes. As I was walking back down to the garage I noticed that the tracks were still there. Still thinking nothing of them I hit them full blast with my blower. They didn't budge. As I was walking down the driveway I started thinking about my words and actions. The things we say and do leave a lasting impression. When we do things to help others or say things to build others up, we may not even realize what a difference it will make in their lives. I think negative words and actions have a deeper impact on others. I have said before that a fast or harsh word is one of the things I wrestle with most in life. When we say hurtful things they cut to the core and may never be forgotten. I am so befuddled when people say a horrible thing and then add "no offense," or "I am just telling you the truth," in an effort to mask their hurtful words with a hint of caring or accountability or love. The Bible recognizes this temptation of the mouth. I think there are more than 60 passages that reference the tongue and the words we say.

Proverbs 12:18 says, "Reckless words pierce like a sword, but the tongue of the wise brings healing." This is a verse that I try and remind myself of often. Sadly, it is often after I have said something foolish to a loved one. Words matter. Words have a much longer lasting impact then we give them credit for. Like those footprints in the snow, you can't just wash them away like they never happened. The mark is there. Guard your tongue. Be the uplifting person God is calling you to be. Remember that your words and your actions have impactful results. The things we say and do also bear witness to God. May all that we say and do reflect the grace of God in Christ Jesus. Maybe we should start our day with this thought from Psalm 19, "May the words of my mouth and the meditation of my heart be pleasing in your sight O Lord, my rock and my redeemer."

Clerk's Corner




The Session of JPC met on January 18, 2022 for its monthly stated meeting. Below are the highlights from that meeting, as well as other important updates:
