

# THOUGHTS FROM PASTOR JAY

#### Real Thankfulness

It is hard to believe that it is November. I guess it is official, the holidays are upon us. November often feels like a short month to me. I know you are saying to yourself, "It does only have 30 days," but that's not what I mean. I mean that time just seems to fly by. We start the month with Generosity. It is my hope that this will be another blessed year for the church. In the middle of the month, we shift gears to Christmas and welcome vendors from the community to the Holiday Market. We also wel-



come the Twum – Barimah family from Orange Feather Community School. We end the month with Thanksgiving and the I<sup>st</sup> Sunday of Advent. Over the Thanksgiving weekend there is also an opportunity to travel to the Operation Christmas Child Processing Center in Charlotte, too.

When things get hectic it is easy to forget to be thankful. Or if we are thankful, it is just an automatic response with little real value or meaning. We should be thankful for the ways our church serves those in need around us. We should be thankful for the great music we enjoy each Sunday. But sadly, we sometimes forget. When children make noise in worship, we should be thankful they are there, but we get annoyed. I Thessalonians calls for us to be thankful in all circumstances. Strive for that this month!

I also think that Thanksgiving has kind of lost its meaning as well. While we still gather with family it seems like football games, shopping, and other things have replaced true thankfulness. Do you remember the story of the original Thanksgiving feast? The pilgrims had a feast to celebrate the harvest after a difficult first year. Now this is just the Pastor Jay history but still they endured a horrible trip across the Atlantic. They arrived in December, so they couldn't grow any crops. They were not prepared for a harsh winter. They didn't build adequate shelter. They got sick. They had very little food. If I remember correctly, right around half of the 100 or so died that first year.

They had been through a battle. Fortunately, the Wampanoag tribe showed them growing tips and showed them how to live in their new land. After a successful harvest they held that first feast to celebrate. About 50 Pilgrims and 90 natives sat down to eat. They came expecting a new land and opportunity and religious freedom. They found hardship. When they sat down to that first feast it was a time of thanks to God that they had even survived. It was about praise and repentance and renewal. Maybe we would be more thankful if we came from a perspective as real as theirs?

I think Psalms are a good way to remember to be thankful. David, even in his darkest moments, praises the Lord. Here is a Psalm to help you along your way this month. Psalm 100 says,

"Shout for joy to the Lord, all the earth.

- Worship the Lord with gladness; come before him with joyful songs.
- 3 Know that the Lord is God.

  It is he who made us, and we are his;
  we are his people, the sheep of his pasture.
- 4 Enter his gates with thanksgiving and his courts with praise; give thanks to him and praise his name.
- 5 For the Lord is good and his love endures forever; his faithfulness continues through all generations.

A spirit of thankfulness often takes work. Make an effort this month to find something to be thankful for each day. Remember to turn in your pledge card as soon as you can. Support the work of Orange Feather Community School. Support that ministries of the church this month that help others. Consider donating food or delivering a food box. But in all things give thanks!

## **CHANGES IN FINANCIAL ACTIVITIES AT JPC**

Your JPC Resource Ministry Team is making some changes in the way our finances are handled here at JPC.

First off, we will no longer employ a Financial Secretary. Instead, JPC has contracted with a Winston-Salem accounting firm, TaxWorksCPA (TWC). The firm is operated by a CPA, Stephen Anderson along with his wife, Lauren (a Methodist minister) and four associates. Currently, they service 26 churches in the area, most are Methodist, but there is one Moravian and one Presbyterian. (They are in the process of on-boarding two more churches in addition to JPC). TWC also has regular business clients in addition to non-profits and churches.

TWC will take over the payroll, bill-pay and financial reporting functions which were handled in-house using Church Windows software. TWC will use Quick Books Online and Quick Books Payroll for these applications. Going forward, JPC will not pay any bills or cut any checks from the church office unless there is an immediate need that cannot be delayed.

For the time being, JPC will continue to use Church Windows for membership and donation records. The Resource Team will be responsible for recording all donations and making the subsequent bank deposits. The Resource Team plans to begin using a remote deposit capture device for transmitting checks to the bank electronically instead of making a weekly trip to the bank. Cash will be deposited when it accumulates to a reasonable amount for a trip to the bank – probably about once a month.

Once the accounts payable and payroll functions are converted over to Quick Books, TWC will cost JPC about the same amount that the Church had budgeted for a Financial Secretary in 2025.

Also, we will be using some new color-coded forms for expense reimbursements and credit card expense approvals. This should be a marked improvement over our present process. More to come as we transition to the new processes. See photos of Steve and Lauren below so you recognize them if you bump into them in the office.



Saturday, February 21<sup>st</sup> at 7:00 pm, David LaMotte will entertain us with an evening of music and storytelling. Over the years, David Lamotte has performed in over 3500 concerts touring in all fifty states, as well as on five of the seven continents. He has performed in such festivals as MerleFest and the Australian National Folk Festival. He has released 13 full length albums, including Still, which was in the top 20 on Folk Radio for six months. His music can be heard on all online steaming services including Spotify, Apple Music, Pandora, and Amazon Music. BBC Radio Belfast describes his music as "charm, stories, humour, insightful songs, sweet voice, and dazzling guitar ability."

Then on <u>Sunday, February 22<sup>nd</sup> at 2:00 pm</u>, David LaMotte will return to JPC for a speaking engagement centered around his book, "You are Changing the World Whether You Like it or Not". A published author of four books, including two children's books, his latest book is an engaging and practical look at how large-scale change happens, how it doesn't, and how to understand our own roles within that effort for positive change.

In anticipation of David LaMotte's visit, we will be engaging in a church-wide study centered around his book beginning in early January. Be on the lookout for more details to come. Several of our church members have already heard him in person before and say David LaMotte provides enjoyable and inspiring messages during his engagements. And the very best part of all, is that both events at JPC are free! Thanks to JPC's Hodgin Endowment Fund, the concert and the book talk are free for everyone.

We are opening this event up to our community as well as other churches in the Salem Presbytery, so you will want to be sure to register for your concert ticket as soon as possible. 


